The course begins with an overview of universal design, continues by developing individual learner profiles with case examples, and ends with fine motor and gross motor instruction design to meet the student's needs.~~

Peer-Mediated Social Skills Play Groups: Selecting Interventions and Measuring Outcomes

Occupational therapists are uniquely positioned among health care providers to guide peer-mediated social skills play groups that are occupation-based. These interventions can be beneficial for reducing negative behaviors and improving occupational performance in populations frequently seen by pediatric occupational therapists. Some of these populations include autism spectrum disorder (ASD), fetal alcohol spectrum disorder (FASD), attention deficit/hyperactivity disorder (ADHD), anxiety disorders, intellectual disabilities, and emotional/behavioral disorders (EBD). Social skills can be introduced in a variety of ways through play with peer mediation and group design allowing for specificity and attention to the individual client within the group. Use of predetermined outcome tools allows for measurement of change of performance of identified issues, an important final step for the evidence-based practice process.

Understanding the Shoulder Girdle to Optimize Upper Extremity Functioning

New graduates in any setting will benefit from this interactive and engaging course on reviewing the anatomy and biomechanics of the shoulder girdle. Without a strong proximal base of support, the upper extremity will not function efficiently limiting return to meaningful occupations. Although OTs may receive a referral not specific to the shoulder, the proximal upper extremity can be affected for various reasons. Regardless if a referral includes a shoulder diagnosis or not, develop confidence in evaluating the shoulder girdle and provide evidence-informed interventions to optimize your clients' use of their upper extremity. This course will involve group activities including marking anatomic structures of the shoulder girdle, assessing resting posture and dynamic movements, manual therapy interventions, and case studies to determine the most effective interventions.
